## Narratives

In the modern media-saturated, globalised world, it is part of the human experience to have an image bank in our minds and memories, both private and personal as well as public and collectively shared. Without such images, and the means to interpret them, we would be in a state of continuous amnesia, a condition in which we would struggle to find meaning and purpose.

All societies and ethnic and culturally-connected groups share image banks of histories, stories and symbols – their narratives. Palestine is no exception. Indeed, its image bank is richer and fuller than many and is shared and familiar across generations and the scattered and broken geography; the collective credit in this bank is rich and equitably distributed. Few explanations are needed as the collective suffering and awareness in examples of such images are mutually understood.

Artists have mined this rich source of images in their personal and idiosyncratic visual languages, and continue to do so as they extend the boundaries and possibilities of media and meaning. The land and physical body may be subject to restrictions but the imagination can be a place and space of freedom and possibility. And of empowerment.

Visual artists, in whatever medium they choose to use as a vehicle for their ideas, are uniquely placed in this regard. The images in the paintings, drawings and sculptures in this exhibition explore the historical legacies and traditions which are being slowly erased, the pleasures but also some of the horrors of Palestinian life, the contradiction of experiencing pain and hope in the same measure, the divisions and separations. Dancing can be a form of uplifting freedom for the body, but there is also a macabre dance that takes place between the occupier and the occupied, the oppressor and the oppressed. Iconic images of the voices of Palestine's soul and its conscience, such as the poet Mahmoud Darwish (in Mohammed Saleh's paintings), are instantly recognized. A shared visual library of images echoes through many of these works: the women in traditional dress, the fruits of labour on the land, the old village houses, mothers protecting their children, birds in flight. But ghostly presences also seem to haunt many of these works. The images that spoke of steadfastness, sumud, defiance and freedom, as well as the natural riches of the land, have been encroached by others: a blinkered carthorse pulling a heavy load (Sliman Mansour), and images of walls and checkpoints (Nabil Anani) which are now also iconic and similarly recognized by everyone. A collective bank of images and voices across time and distance, reflecting Palestinian life and their unique narrative in all its forms.




Nabil Anani was born in 1943, in Latroun, Palestine. Anani is one of the most prominent Palestinian artists working today. He is considered by many as a key founder of the contemporary Palestinian art movement.

On graduating in Fine Art from Alexandra University, Egypt in 1969, Anani returned to his native Palestine and began a fruitful career as an artist and a teacher trainer at the UN training college in Ramallah. Anani held his first exhibition in Jerusalem in 1972 and has since exhibited widely in Europe, North America, the Middle East, North Africa and Japan - both as an individual artist and with groups of his Palestinian contemporaries.

Anani is a multi-talented artist, for he is a painter, a ceramicist and a sculptor. He pioneered the use of local media such as leather, henna, natural dyes, Papier-mâché, wood, beads and copper. Over the past four decades, Anani has built an impressive catalogue of outstanding, innovative and unique art.

Anani was awarded the first Palestinian National Prize for Visual Art in 1997 and became the head of the League of Palestinian Artists in 1998. On retiring from his teaching post in 2003, Anani has dedicated much of his time to voluntary pastimes, leading on the League's activities and playing a key role in the establishment of the first International Academy of Fine Art in Palestine - with the assistance of the University of Oslo and the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs.



**Sliman Mansour** was born in Birzeit in 1947 and studied fine art at the Bezalel Art Academy in Jerusalem. He is one of the most prominent Palestinian artists working today and is considered a founder member of the contemporary Palestinian art movement. Mansour's work centers around the Palestinian struggle, portraying peasants and women in traditional dress in his early work. During the first Intifada against Israeli occupation (1987-1993), Mansour and other artists in the "New Vision" art movement started in 1987 boycotted Israeli supplies and used local materials like mud and henna in his work. For Mansour, art aids the continuation and revival of Palestinian identity, particularly as it captures images of the land and people working in the land.

He has held solo exhibitions in Ramallah, New York, Sharjah, Cairo, Gaza and Norway. His group exhibitions include Museum of Oriental Art, Moscow in 1980, Palestinian Spring, Jerusalem in 1985, New Visions, Amman in 1991 and Made in Palestine, Houston, Texas in 2003. In 1998 he received the Palestine Prize for the Visual Arts at the Cairo Biennial.





**Asad Azi** was born in Shfa 'Amr in the Western Galilee in 1955. He earned his BA degree in art from The University of Haifa and then continued his studies at Tel Aviv University. In 1981 he visited the Italian village of Cararra where he was exposed to the secrets of Marble sculpture. Azi has published many articles and studies in the local Arabic newspapers and has received several awards. He has set up more than 17 solo exhibitions and has participated in more than 50 collective exhibitions locally and internationally. He currently lives and teaches art in Yaffa.

Jawad Al Malhi was born in Shufat Refugee Cam, Jerusalem, in 1969 and attained his MA in Fine Art from the Winchester School of Art, UK, in 2007.

A multi-disciplinary artist, Al Malhi works across painting, installation, photography and video. A keen observer of the human condition, his work explores the architecture and geography of marginality.

Exhibitions include Ground Floor America at Den Frie in Copenhagen, in the Middle of the Middle at Sfeir-Semier Gallery, Beirut, No Man's Land in Gemak, The Hague, the Sharjah Biennal 09 and Palestine c/o Venice in 2009.

Al Malhi lives and works on the border of Shufat refugee camp, where he co-founded the Open Studio Palestine, a project that runs art workshops for children. In 2009, he was short listed for the Frieze Foundation Cartier Award and Prix Pictet.

**Tayseer Barakat** was born in Gaza in 1959 and completed his arts education in Alexandria, Egypt, in 1983. After completing his studies, he moved to Ramallah where he has since based – both teaching and creating art.

A multi-talented artist, Barakat has worked with a variety media and has experimented widely – with wood, metal and glass – and has become one of Palestine's foremost artists working today. Painting remains his first love and he continues to work at a prolific rate, drawing on the artistic heritage of the region and its ancient influences. His style and technique are of international stature, often appealing to a wide range of audiences.

Barakat has held 9 solo exhibitions and has participated in numerous group exhibitions with many of his contemporaries in Japan, USA, Brazil, Europe and across the Arab world. His Solo exhibitions have included Sao Paulo Biennale, Sao Paulo, Brazil in 1996, The Number that Became a Name, Ramallah in 2006 and Distant Voices, Zawyeh Gallery, Ramallah in 2014.

Sana Farah-Bishara was born in Nazareth in 1964. In 1985, she graduated from the Neri Bloomfield Academy of Design and Education in Haifa. In 1988, she received her B.A. in fine art and sociology from the University of Haifa, followed by a degree in museology. She has taught art and ceramics in a number of schools and community centers. Sana has served as the Director of Art Education for Arab Schools at the Janco Dada Museum, Ein Hod. She worked as an art teacher for the ministry of Education. The artist is a member of the Painters and Sculptors Association of Haifa. Her sculptures have participated in a number of private collections. In 2000, She received an honorary prize for Haifa artists and in 2007 she earned the Herman Struck Prize.

Marwa Najjar is a Palestinian painter. She was born in Amman, Jordan in 1984. She's known for her haunting portraits and delicate gold and silver leaf work. She graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Fine Arts from Al-Najah University in Nablus, Palestine in 2005, returning there the following year to teach. Najjar's works focus on the beauty of women and children. She combines this with inspiration drawn from the works of Gustav Klimt and Byzantine religious iconography of the fifteenth and sixteenth centuries, especially in her use of gold and silver leaf. In 2006, the artist painted icons on the walls and domes of Saint Maria Cathedral in Nablus. Since 2012 she has participated in many solo and joint exhibitions. Marwa currently lives and works in Amman, Jordan.




